DON'T MISJUDGE THE DOMINIONS!

MANY people seem to have gathered a rather low idea of the aims and objects of the Dominions from what happened at the Imperial Conference. That unfortunate event, which showed little practical result of any benefit, has done real harm if it has implanted any misunderstanding of our Overseas cousins in our minds. We have heard the view expressed that the Dominions were mainly actuated by the desire for more power and that other considerations were mainly secondary to that. It seems to be assumed that the possession by the Dominions of more power automatically means a loosening of the ties of Empire.

Perhaps this is the case, and if so it is very regrettable. Nevertheless whoever is to blame for this, it is not the Dominions. Nobody can say sincerely that the present British Government is a satisfactory one, that it is doing all that the nation requires, and is honestly straining every nerve to abolish unemployment! Can it be wondered, then, that the Dominions, seeing what a muddle and mess the Socialists have made of this country, should desire to have as little as possible to do with them? Do we in this country wish to see ourselves, not to mention the Empire, under Socialist control? The Dominions are not to be blamed, they are to be envied, for being outside the control of the crack-brained authority of British party politicians.

Let us remember one very important point. The Dominions have a system of government in most things very similar to our own, and that system here involves the right of the British Prime Minister to advise the Sovereign direct. Can any valid reason be advanced

against according the same privilege to the Dominion Prime Ministers?

FASCISM AND ITS OPPONENTS

MOST of the misunderstandings of Fascism are due to ignorance, but nobody is so ignorant as the person who will not learn.

Economic Fascism is ultimately unavoidable. Then why do we seek to propagate it? Why not wait till events have produced it? That, certainly, sounds easy and attractive, but it can only be by allowing things to go from bad to worse—as they are doing—that Fascism can be achieved in that way. As that means untold suffering to our people, and greater poverty and unemployment, we should be traitors to the country if we failed in our duty of bringing the people to Fascism by education instead of by starvation.

Fascism calls to mind that excellent state of affairs "when each was for the other, and all were for the State." We ought to think more of what is for the State, that is, for the benefit of everybody. In Italy there was a revolution, the workers seized the works, and when it came to paying wages there was nothing to pay with, so that they had to ask the employers to come back and help them. It is nothing peat-liar that the Italians found someone to lead them. We want someone to lead us. We all like a leader and appreciate a strong man. If Fascism would bring people to go for the national benefit and cut out this horrible class intrigue which has grown up in the last few years, it would do the country a lasting service. It is not merely the Italian proletariat who are bound together under the Fascist system, but the whole nation is united in the service of Italy. We in this country are apt to hear more of the exile's point of view, but, compared with the whole population, the number of dissentients is infinitesimal, and certainly it is the best thing for Italy that such people should be compelled to leave the country. Signor Nitti's testimony can scarcely be regarded as unbiased in view of his never having seen the country under the Fascist regime, for he left in 1921, and has not been there since. That, however, is not Italy's loss,

LETTING DOWN OUR COUNTRY ABROAD

[Extracts from a letter from Miss Kate Hanbury, Kilfaro Kilbara, Nyeri, Kenya Colony (who, with two sisters, settled in

"We are all very upset by the Labour Government's two White Papers issued here and in England on the 20th of June. I wish you could read the speech of Sir Edward Grigg (the Governor) to the Legislative Council here, which was sent to England by mail on the 21st of July. It gave a good description of the position. The White Papers are a scandalous breach of faith to the Settlers and a reversal of policy.

- (1) Paramountcy of the native;
- (2) A common roll;
- (3) All-British settlers are now the only immigrant community—these are the chief points.

The native policy was to have been put in action at once, but as there were certain points to be altered by the Legislative Council to put it in force there is to be a discussion. Put it to yourself--paramountcy of savages! Then where are the British settlers to come in? Sir

Edward Grigg was once secretary to Mr. Lloyd George, so I hope the speech will influence the latter to keep the points in mind. There has been a very great upset here, and still is a deputation from here is to go and put the case before both Houses of Parliament. Can't you do anything to help us? People in England don't seem to realize what the Labour Government is after here—part of the Empire, which you should all understand and feel for. It is a case for British settlers, ' Hold your own, but we are going to have a hard fight for it, and need all our friends in the old country to understand the position. Do what you can."

BETRAYAL OF MONTENEGRO

POLITICIANS have betrayed the Warrior Nation of Montenegro. Let us not forget it.

When Austria invaded Serbia in August, 1914, King Nicholas of Montenegro answered the Serbian appeal for help, and with his small army he covered the retreat of the Serbs, for which the Crown Prince of Serbia (now King of Jugoslavia), visited Cettinge to express his gratitude to the King of Montenegro.

But the Austrians, with overwhelming forces, occupied Serbia and Montenegro, in 1916, and King Nicholas and his Government took refuge in France.

After the Armistice in 1918, King Nicholas was detained in France against his will. Then the Serbs seized Montenegro with Judas-like treachery, and although a last desperate effort was made by 3,000 Montenegrins to regain by force their homeland, filched from them by treachery, they were met by 25,000 Austrian troops, and after three weeks' fighting they were summoned to surrender to that very Serbian army that they had saved from annihilation. They refused, and broke through the invaders, reached the coast, and were taken to safety in Italian men-of-war, and, with their Prince Milo, they have been exiles for eleven years. Their friends and relations left in Montenegro were reduced to unwilling servitude to the Serbs, by torture, rapine, pillage, murder, and cruelties too vile to describe.

Mr. Asquith and Mr. Lloyd George both promised Montenegro restoration to her former sovereign independence. President Wilson telegraphed to King Nicholas, on the 4th July, 1918 :— "I trust your Majesty and the noble Montenegrin people will not be cast down, but will have confidence in the determination of the United States to see that, in the final victory, the integrity and the rights of Montenegro will be secured and recognized."

Lord Sydenham warned the British Government that the honour of England had been pledged to the hilt to restore Montenegro her independence, and that "broken promises always bring their own Nemesis."

On the 11th March, 1920, Lord Sydenham asked by what right had King Nicholas been deposed and the Sovereign State of Montenegro blotted out of the map. The reply was evasive.

Montenegro has done nothing to forfeit her independence, which she has maintained for five centuries. She is the only Balkan State never conquered by the Turk. She sided with us in the war, and has been treated more harshly than any of our late enemies.

It is the mission of British Fascism to expose political crimes such as this, and to weed out Party Slave's, and to win over to our simple faith and business-like methods of government those trained politicians who have principles and souls of their own that they will not surrender to the bullying of a Party Whip.

In such, if they exist, we have faith that they will find out the truth about Montenegro, and see to it that justice is done. What do Englishmen feel about the way in which politicians have dishonoured their reputation for honour and justice? What do Americans feel about the failure to honour the words of their President Wilson?

There has been a conspiracy of silence. The world has not been allowed to know the truth about little Montenegro.

Of what use is the League of Nations, the supposed champion of the rights of little

nations, if it cannot restore to Montenegro her King? It is too late to make amends to King Nicholas. He died in enforced exile. But we Fascists hope to see Montenegro restored to her former dignity.

The creatures in the guise of men who crucified this brave little Monarchy are of the same type, as those who gave liberty to conscientious objectors to help the Germans while our boys were fighting in defence of the weak against military despotism. Many an English lad went to his death as the direct result of the liberty accorded to traitors in our midst in the war, and after the war these same sexless worms have tried in every way to kiss the enemies of the ex-Service man and of the unemployed, and to throw fresh burdens on our loyal citizens. Such are the creatures who betrayed Montenegro, who ruined and killed General Dyer, of Amritsar, for doing his duty when he thwarted the plans of the Bolsheviks to create another Indian Mutiny.

We are accustomed to dis-honour in England now, but the case of Montenegro affects our world reputation, and the story is thus briefly told so that those who have any pride of race left may raise their voices and com-pel our politicians to see justice done, or else kick them into the gutter as, unworthy to represent our people. This is riot a matter of party politics ; for, as long as the promises made in the name of our people to little Montenegro are dishonoured, all parties are guilty and contemptible. **W. E. R. THE UNITY BAND MONTHLY NOTES

The Anti-Imperial Conference.—The disruptive achievements of this disastrous conclave are gradually leaking out, and the final dissolution of the Empire is gradually emerging as a fait accompli. To be quite fair to the members of the Conference, including our own -representatives, they have only, as the Lord Chancellor points out, been putting into effect the ill-omened Balfour declaration of 1926, which in form and intention pronounced the Empire to be at an end. The British Commonwealth of Nations, which is absurdly

pretended to have taken its place, is merely a meaningless form of words. It represents no tangible association of the "Sovereign Independent States" with each other, and it is not intended to do so. The pretended link of the Crown is purely illusory, and is meant to remain so, since there is no central government through whom the monarch can any longer think or act imperially. Since he is compelled to act on the scattered and separated advice of half a dozen independent Prime Ministers, he might actually, in this ridiculous commonwealth, find himself as nominal head of one so-called Dominion declaring war on himself as the nominal head of another.

One of the first fruits of this organized anarchy in the once united Empire has been the selection by the Labour Premier of Australia -of the Governor-General, whose Minister he is supposed to be. As a flaunting gesture of "sovereign independence," this would be hard to beat.

Another aftermath of the Conference has been the insult hurled at the Premier and Government of Canada by the egregious political adventurer and demagogue, Mr. J. H. Thomas, who under our present perverted polity is allowed to figure as a Minister of the Crown. Not only was Mr. Bennett the protagonist, at the Conference, of the vain effort to attain some degree of economic co-operation, but he was apparently the only representative who made any effective protest against the process of political disunity, which by his patriotic action he may at any rate have delayed for a few months. It is easy on both counts to understand why he has been made the target of Mr. Thomas's abuse.

India.—The tragic farce of trying to adapt the precepts and practices of democracy, already hopelessly discredited in the Western World, to the totally unsuited conditions of the East is still being played. Disregarding absolutely and entirely the interests and real wishes of the vast population in. India, for whose welfare we are responsible, our politicians are proposing to hand them over to the tender mercies of a handful of talkers and agitators, who profess to render lip service to the democratic idea. Fortunately the ruling Princes of India, who are still loyal to the

King-Emperor and have no desire or intention to come under the dominance of the Jabberjees and Chatter-boys of Bengal or Bombay, seem likely at the last moment partially to save the situation and to introduce some degree of sanity and common sense into the proceedings of the Round Table Conference.

"Back to the Land" Again.—The proposed land policy of the Government, which, as might have been expected from his record in the past of fustian and failure, has secured the enthusiastic support of Mr. Lloyd George, can only be described as an exhibition of criminal lunacy.

It is notorious to-day that, owing to the dumping in this country, even at a price below the cost of production, of every form of agricultural produce from abroad, the farming community in Great Britain is on the verge of ruin. The Government absolutely refuse to stop the dumping or to take any effective steps to enable the working of the land to be carried on at a profit. But they actually propose, at the cost of untold millions, to place upon the land, displacing to that extent the present skilled cultivators, a vast number of incompetent and indigent smallholders to carry out experiments in farming at the public expense, and presumably to be allowed, in case of almost certain failure, to draw the dole as before. They propose at the same time to revive, again at vast expense, the attempted assessment and collection of the futile land taxes which even Mr. Lloyd George himself, their proud originator, had to abandon as a hopeless failure.

The Government and Russia.—The attitude of our present Government to the Soviet resembles unpleasantly the conduct of the beaten cur which persists in licking the hand or the boot that administered the punishment. What actual hold the ruffian camarilla of Moscow can have established over His Majesty's Ministers to have reduced them to this state of abject subservience can only be conjectured. But the subservience is obvious and almost unabashed.

Whitechapel and the Jews.—I must confess to a feeling of satisfaction that the Zionist pandering to the Jewish electorate in

Whitechapel on the part of the Conservative candidate met with the complete failure which it deserved. Two facts must be borne in mind as regards this incident. It was, of course a Conservative politician, Lord Balfour, who was the author of the fatal Palestine Declaration which practically committed the British Government to the iniquitous policy of trying to dispossess the Arab population of Palestine in order to colonize the country with imported Jews. It is one of the few actions which stand to the credit of the present Government that they expressed publicly the utter injustice and impossibility of carrying into effect the extreme wishes of the Zionists in interpreting this infamous and disgraceful declaration which has already, as might have been predicted, resulted in bloodshed and civil war. The fact is—and it would be well to face it at once—that no British Government could ever have the moral effrontery to enforce the declaration, whatever the Conservative candidate might bring himself to promise to the Jewish electors of Whitechapel. The fact is also that the majority of Jews, at any rate in this country, although the idea may appeal to their racial pride, have no intention of availing themselves of the alternative nationality which the declaration offers them, and are content to remain British citizens, in which capacity they can continue to rely on the goodwill and good fellowship of their Christian fellow-subjects.

Party Government "In Extremis."—Not only upon the saner and more reflective intellects of the Conservative and Liberal Parties, but even at last upon the wild and disordered mentality of some of the Socialists, the impression is, gaining ground that the continuance of the party system has become frankly impossible in the present desperate state of the nation. Sir Oswald Mosley, of all people, has attained a glimpse of statesmanlike insight, and, stirred to protest by the hopeless incapacity of his chosen associates, has put in a plea for a sort of emergency Government to take the place of the discredited gang who are conducting the country to ruin.

A more rational and convincing plea is put forward by Sir Frank Fox in his notable book (published by Stanley Paul, 5s. net.) **"Parliamentary Government a Failure."**

Everyone should read this able and ruthless exposure of the democratic delusion. Whilst it differs in points of detail as regards the ultimate cure for the national disorders, it repeats and emphasizes many of the ideas which we in the Unity Band are striving to realize. It supplies yet another proof, if more are needed, that all the sound opinion of the country is gradually inclining to the view that no temporary victory or defeat of any one party, old, new, national, or otherwise, is going to save us from disaster; but that what is wanted, and must soon be forthcoming, is the drastic elimination of the entire party and democratic system, and the reorganization of the government on rational lines. Signor Mussolini is said to have hazarded a prediction that startling measures would have to be adopted by Great Britain within the next five years to set her house in order, but that he believed it could and would be accomplished. May he be a true prophet! There is certainly no time to lose.

Fortunate France. — Another French Government has fallen, and it is safe to say that, outside the small circle of parliamentary politicians, no one in France feels a penny the better or worse. It is possible also that the name of the new Prime Minister is almost unknown to the outer world. It is the custom among our neighbours for the older Members of the Chamber of Deputies to take it in turns to form Governments, whose existence it is not etiquette to prolong as a rule for more than a year at most. The reason why these amiable alternations of office among the politicians make so little stir in the actual life of the French nation is that neither Government nor Parliament would be allowed, even if they wished it, to interfere fundamentally with the steady and normal life of the French people, whose civilization is considered to have arrived and to be immune anyhow from violent assaults by unscrupulous and self-seeking demagogues. France, once the home of revolution and unrest, has become the most secure and conservative country in Europe. Although it was a Frenchman who said "*La propriété, c'est le vol,*" there is no community in the world where property is so safe, so eagerly acquired, or so widely distributed. Taxation, compared to our own, is absurdly light in a nation which has only recently emerged from a devastating war, but whose

rulers had the astuteness, or the good fortune, to reduce the national debt by the inflation of the currency, instead of nearly doubling it, as our own did, by deflation and the gold standard, and adding to our burdens by an orgy of reckless and unprofitable public expenditure. Had such a policy been pursued in France, it is pretty certain that it would have defeated its own ends, for the French people would simply have refused to pay the exorbitant taxes necessary to finance it. The parliamentary sessions are devoted frankly to talk, and it is by no means unusual for several politicians to be talking at once, but it is recognized complacently, by the outside public, that they are far better employed in this way than in passing, as ours do under the order of the party Whips, masses of mischievous and unwanted legislation. For a Frenchman to have his property confiscated by Act of Parliament in order to buy his neighbour's vote would be unthinkable, whilst the suggestion of a law by which he should be told at what hour and to what extent he should be permitted to drink, dance, or smoke would probably consign its promoters to the asylum at Charenton. The country is quietly administered by respectable officials, with whom the political Ministers do not unduly interfere.

The naval and military defences of the nation are maintained on the theory that, as they were most certainly needed in a recent desperate emergency, they might possibly be required again.

Foreign policy is conducted, quietly and capably, in the interests not of other countries but of France herself, to maintain whose safety and prosperity is considered the primary obligation of every citizen, an obligation which no politician, however eloquent or internationally addicted, would be allowed, for a moment to impugn.

To sum up the situation, democracy may be said in France, once its spiritual home, to have been rendered innocuous by confinement, as it were, within the walls of a debating society, effectively barred from mischievous action, and signs are not wanting at the present day that, even as an item of conversation, and a subject for debate, it has very nearly talked itself out.

To the Editor of "British Fascism"

An Anti-British Organization

Sir,==The letter by Mr. John Boon in your November issue is grossly offensive. He has no right to bring the names of the King and Prince of Wales into political argument. His Majesty acts by the advice of his Ministers, and at present a Socialist Government is in power. Mr. Boon must be singularly ignorant not to know that the Royal Family is above politics. He has no right to drag in the names of the King and Prince of Wales in support of that very contemptible organization — the League of Nations Union — to which he belongs. His suggestion is impudent nonsense.

He states that the League of Nations Union membership is 750,000. After seeing its meetings, I should want an auditor's certificate before believing that. If what he says is true, why are the audiences, so poor? A few months ago, I went with five Fascists to heckle at a League of Nations Union meeting. On arrival, we discovered that we were the audience, or nearly so. There were three speakers on the platform, and six ladies and two gentlemen in the hall. So instead of heckling, we waited till the principal speaker

had got started, and then trickled out, one by one.

If Fascists care to waste time ploughing through Col. House's memoirs, they will see that the Geneva "League of Nations" was invented by the late President Woodrow Wilson, than whom there never was a more spiteful enemy of this country. President Wilson's pose as a lover of peace was merely a cloak of hypocrisy for his hatred of England. He threatened us with war when we made cotton contraband, and yet, when the "Lusitania" was sunk, and 1,100 Americans—men, women, and children—drowned by the Germans, he sent a letter to the Kaiser apologizing for their deaths. A more contemptible politician never breathed.

Colonel House's memoirs reveal that President Wilson's idea in forming the Geneva "League of Nations" was to trick this country into a dishonourable peace, and win the next presidential election by the help of the anti-British voters—Germans and Sinn Feiners — in the United States. We British nailed the cheat, and when President Wilson came here on his way to the Versailles Conference, he was so disappointed that he could hardly be civil. As all are now aware, when in London he was not normal. He died a few years later in a private mental hospital.

I think a very good motto for the League of Nations Union would be that verse from the Psalms which reads : " Behold, was shapen in iniquity and in sin did my mother conceive me." At the League of Nations Union meeting one seems to walk into a region the atmosphere of which seems saturated with falsehood.

The League of Nations Union exists for the purpose of destroying our national life by destroying our national consciousness.

When our nationality is gone, then on the ruins of that only real League of Nations -- the British Empire—their wretched Geneva "League of Nations" is to be erected. The League of Nations Union is, an enemy, but not an honest enemy, of this country. Lectures are given here sneering at love of country and deriding patriotism.

But let any other part of the British Empire claim nationhood in a way likely to injure us, and immediately the League of Nations Union, which abuses national sentiment in us, becomes vocal in its praise. The League of Nations Union does not warn the people of South Ireland that national sentiment is silly. Oh, no! It recognizes it in a way best suited to injure this country. It has recognized what it calls "Egyptian nationality." Even the silliness is committed of calling the teeming races of our Indian Empire a nation. The Sinn Feiners are to have a nation. The Egyptian fellaheen are to have a nation. The Bengali babu is to have a nation. But the English—they must not have a nation. Oh, no! For the Englishman—his "narrow nationalism" is to be merged in the "wider patriotism" of the Geneva "League of Nations."

The League of Nations Union practises the meanest of hypocrisy, because, while claiming to be anti-militarist, it clamours against no, other armed forces except those of the British Empire. Its pretended desire of disarmament is a cheat, for where-ever armed forces exist which are hostile to this country, to these it shows friendship. It preaches down the British army, but do its speakers ever suggest that the army of the so-called Irish Free State should be disarmed? Not likely. Last summer, a number of League of Nations Union meetings were field demanding decreases in the Royal Air Force, and protesting against the "sin" of preparing to bomb helpless populations. While these meetings were on, another consignment of four bombing aeroplanes flew from Handley Page's, at Hendon, to Dublin. Did the League of Nations Union protest against the wickedness of the' so-called Free State Government in increasing its bombing aircraft? Of course not. Those aeroplanes might one day be used for air raids over English cities!

The League of Nations Union is consistent in nothing except its unwavering hostility to this country. Its hypocrisy has deceived people who would turn their backs on it if its bitter rancour against England were known. It is for those who love their country to expose the League of Nations Union. It is desire to injure England which has, brought the League of Nations Union into being. Throughout the

ages two great primal passions—Love and Hate—have been seen in constant opposition, but always it is love that conquers hate. That is why I believe that love of country will destroy the League of Nations Union, and the vile hatred of England for which it stands. *Yours, Richard H. 
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
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
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
