Do We Desire To Bind **Ourselves**

HE absurd publicity which has been' attached to the name Fascist recently, greatly owing to the publicity of the "Colonel Barker" case, has opened the eyes of some people to the large number of British Fascists who are to be found in this country.

The fact that "Colonel Barker" was never connected with the British Fascists did not seem, at the time, to be fully realised. Nevertheless it was a fact. Some five years ago, when the British Fascists were first inaugurated as the only body capable of adequately dealing with the Communist menace, it was only to be expected that one or two hot-heads should creep in among the seriously minded Patriots who form the nucleus of the organisation. But it did not take General Headquarters long to find out who these hot-heads were and to weed them out. This, of course, did not suit the books of those who were so dismissed, and the result was an almost Gilbertian body, who called themselves the National Fascisti, who guarded their Headquarters with wooden swords, whose language on the platform was forceful, but a trifle illogical and who adopted a uniform as closely approaching that of the :Italian Fascisti as it was possible to get. To give them their due, they did gradually settle down: at one time British Fascists General Headquarters were glad to see that they took their responsibilities a little more seriously.

It was at about that time that "Colonel Barker" joined the National Fascisti and, if reports tell 71 Elm Park Gardens, us truly, "Colonel Barker" was a useful S.W.10. member of the organisation.

As one would expect, however, this little bunch of "Men" soon found that sincerity was the only foundation upon which a truly Fascist organisation can rest. The result was that the National Fascisti dropped out of existence; and so "Colonel Barker" became once more an ordinary citizen.

That, as far as we can see, is the history of "Colonel Barker" and you can see that "he" was never connected in any way with the British Fascists organisation.

The antagonism which the Daily Express shows towards the Fascist Movement would be easily understood if that periodical had Socialist tendencies; but, for a paper which professes Conservatism, and more especially Patriotism, it must be beyond the comprehension of the thinking Patriot and even the clever politician. There seems to be one possible reason for this and it is to be found in the tremendous amount of selfwhich characterises esteem Lord Beaverbrook. It is our opinion that an organisation with the same principles as British Fascism could, if it had Lord Beaverbrook at its head, command not only the full support of the Daily Express and its associated papers, but also that of its great number of easily-led readers.

During the General Strike of 1926, The British Fascists were asked by the Daily Express to assist in the distribution of its Sunday paper and cars were supplied for this purpose which ran, one to Norwich, one to Chelmsford, one to Newport in South Wales, and one to Nuneaton via Wendover, Aylesbury and Rugby. On May 16th, a. letter was written to the General Manager of the Daily Express, whose reply on the following day, in very non-committal tones, is found below.

of prominent The recent statements Communists have brought a new light to the question of how the-fight between. Capital and labour is to he brought to a head. They discount the suggestion that Socialists will be responsible for the uprising which must, according to anti-Capitalists, take place. It is the intention, it appears, that the Socialists, or even the Communists, shall obtain the reins of control in this country through the ballot boxes, and once they have complete control, they will force upon the Country such measures as will rob Britain once and for all of control of its own finance, manufactures, and trade. But they have, here, reckoned without the far-seeing common-sense of the great British Public. They have also left out of: their calculations the force which can be exerted by an organisation with a membership as huge as that of the British Fascists. Commander Locker-Lampson at Fascist Children's Clubs Meeting at Kensington

AT Kensington Town Hall on Thursday, March 14th, a meeting took place, which was one of the series of public meetings which the British Fascists hold from time to time, to endeavour to bring home to the British Public the menace to British children of the Red Sunday Schools. "Who has the Youth has the Future" was one of the sayings of Carl Liebknecht, a communist of the worst degree. Those whose dealings have brought them into close touch with children will know how true his saying is.

Mr. Arthur Sebright was prevented by illness from attending the meeting, and



was keen.

Colonel Lane, who Chairman at the meeting, said that people, including even our leading M.P's, did not seem to realise that if it had not

been for the British Fascists there would have been no free speech at the last two elections in 1923 and 1924, for Conservatives and even good Liberals. He advised all British Fascists to stall this when they hear the organisation being disparaged. He also pointed out that the **British** people should realise indebtedness Commander to Lampson for forcing the Government to break up Arcos which was a centre of a Communism—not only for the British Isles, but for our Colonies and even other countries.

Commander Locker-Lampson, whose valuable presence was appreciated very greatly by the audience, was received with great applause. We quote below his speech in full.

Commander Locker-Lampson

I am delighted to be once again in this hall, once again at a gathering of British Fascists and once again under the chairmanship of Col. Lane. I am glad to see him here although he has left little for me to say, nevertheless, I thank him for coming. I must say that I hope he will help us and encourage us right up to the election, through it and afterwards.

I must say that amongst those under the age of 30 in this audience there is no reason why meetings should not be kept in order during the coming election.

The King.

I should like to have a word with you on a matter very near my heart. This is a nonpolitical meeting and there may be every class of people in the audience, but there is one matter which by common consent must be of Communist in the. country will register his

disappointment interest to every single individual in this country and to every party in the State: Ladies and Gentlemen, it is a matter of congratulation to the loyalty of the British Fascists and every loyal person that the King is hale and hearty once more. There is a place in our hearts he will always fill, and his attention to duty has endeared him to everyone and we hope that God has spared him for many years to come.

> The King represents the monarchy and I take the liberty of being a very strong Monarchist. I hold the view that a king is absolutely vital. After the Great War we know that many countries lost their kings. Germany lost her emperor, but I must admit that even a republic in Germany is better than a monarchy and kingship under that crown.

Lived in Russia

I had to live in Russia and other republican countries during the war and my view is that there is a greater sense of justice in the countries ruled over by a king than in a republic. I have nothing to say against the great republic of America, but probably it was because they were a republic and not a monarchy that they were late in coming into the war.

I know that a monarch is vital and there is one other issue in connection with it, that we must never forget—he is the real head of the State to-day and there is not a member of the House of Commons, whether Conservative. Liberal or Labour who has not taken the oath to the King. He is there by common consent and if you get rid of him who are you going to put in his place? You will choose a President who will be chosen by the party in power and he will then naturally be unpopular with the other parties.

What about our dominions? Our monarch is the link between us and our colonies, Long may he live!

The General Election

There is a general election coming within the next two months and 27,000,000 people will have a vote and I am certain that every get someone to take his place and put a cross against the name of his candidate. A great many people who believe as you and I do will not go to the poll: In Australia, not to use a vote is an offence against the law and yet here I find that people fail at the last moment. They have not been called upon for five years to vote at an election and they should use their vote better than that.



The **Traditions** of The Country

We have to elect a body of members of Parliament and these members have to maintain the traditions of this country,

There is one issue that I am going to speak to you about—our chairman mentioned our campaign to clear out the reds. I am very proud indeed that I was the instrument in any way to clear these reds out of England. I was told at the time that I had made a mistake, I was told that I knew nothing whatever about the history of Russia or Europe. When starting our campaign I was told that if we had a rupture with Russia we should have war. There has not been one single instance of a war, but the war difficulties in China have come to an end because British justice has been better than it ever was.

Working days lost through **Strikes**

Do you know how many working days were lost to the working classes in this country on the average during the five years before we cleared them out? 45,000,000. Do you know how many hours have been lost since?. 51,000,000. 5,000,000 was paid out in strik pay and only £100,000 since we cleared them out.

and I am sure that if a Comrade is ill he will What is going to happen as the result of the coming general election There are three parties standing-Unionist, Liberals and Labour with a few Communists. I want to ask every candidate who is standing at the election whether, if he is returned to Power, he will vote against the return the reds to England. What will happen if the Unionists get back to power? There is no doubt they will shut the doors against the reds. What about the Labour Party. Mr. Ramsay MacDonald said that the first act of a Labour candidate will be to allow the return of the reds. Mr. Lloyd George said that, the rupture with Russia was the greatest folly of our government. Whatever you do, return a government who will not take its marching orders from Russia!

The danger of Apathy

The apathy is very great—whilst we are doing nothing the enemy is working underground and hundreds of thousands of pounds are ready for the next election. They are going to subsidise the Communists and hire hooligans to break up meetings and howl down our speakers. I have only once in my life had a meeting broken up—never again. I invited everybody who had broken it up to come to the following day's meeting, where they would have the time of their lives, but if they did not behave themselves they would have the time of their death, and we had a meeting which has never been forgotten in that neighbourhood and ever since I have had order everywhere.

Keep out the Reds.

We are again starting our campaign to keep out the reds and are going to bring our workings up to fighting strength. We are going to form a body of loyalists all through the. country who are going to meet the challenge of our English liberty and freedom of speech and we want your support.

In the name of all that we hold dear we ask you not to support any policy which sends the children to the vilest schools to learn the vilest doctrines. To take the children of the country and destroy the souls of the innocents is a crime never to be forgiven in Heaven and I ask you to help to keep the red hands oil the

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The Significance of the General Election S. Shewell

Every thinking voter must read this article

THE shadow of the General Election is already cast over the industrial, social, political and -.domestic life of the nation. It is the topic of the hour. It is certain that this. topic will be discussed with increasing fervour in the press of the country between now and May, and the right of the worker to have cheaper beer will he enthusiastically maintained in every "pub" in the country.



It is The Topic of The Hour

Despite the mental activity engendered by the approach of the Election among those who, in the past five years, have not been troubled with a political

thought (as well as those who have) it is safe to say that the real significance of the issues at stake is not in the least understood by the majority of the electorate.

A Popular Idea

The popularity of the democratic idea depends upon the supposition that the democratic larger electorate the more nearly will the "Will of the people" be expressed through their elected representatives. This is a point we are not going to discuss just now, but, because of the swollen electorate of 1929, it may not be amiss (in fact it may be considered of some importance) to help them to a clearer understanding of the task they are about to undertake at the Polling Station (if they attend). Let us therefore view the situation in retrospect and prospect as briefly and succinctly as we can without, we hope, still further confusing the politically uneducated.

Prior to the emergence of the Socialist Party as a political force in England, the issue was clear and distinct as between two parties, basing their outlook on the same fundamentals but differing as to detail.

The last General Election saw the submergence of one of these parties the Liberal Party—together with an accession of strength to the Socialist Party.

Effect of Zinovieff Letter

This, save for the decimated ranks of Liberalism, was almost a return to the two party system and came about because the electorate at that time received a shock. They were given forcibly and clearly to see the real and vital issues, which they were called upon to decide by the publication of the famous Zinovicff Letter—said to be a forgery by some but admitted to be genuine by the Socialist Prime Minister—Mr. Ramsay MacDonald.

Through the agency of this revelation the nation saw in a flash what, students of politics and foreign affairs already knew; and very definitely they threw their weight in the scale on the side of England, refusing to be represented by the enemies of England—the Socialist Party. One wonders, however, what would have happened, had not the Red Letter shockingly awakened the sleeping electorate.

In 1924, the Socialists were beaten in the political arena, and immediately turned their attention to the destruction of industry, by stirring up class hatred and engineering strikes in the hope that, in the words of *The Miner's Next Step* they would "absorb the whole of the employers' profits." How far, they have been successful in their role of "The Wreckers is mutely testified by the terrible state of the mining industry, and the heartrending army of unemployed—an army which has been created and is being exploited for party purposes.

The could have saved the Nation

Stronger action by the Government would have saved a great deal of misery and destruction, and the question is Government being seriously asked in these days, "Has the Conservative Party justified the trust man, this ancient seeker after power, gavotte placed in it?" We shall know how far that about the political stage with his Illusionist party has retained the confidence of the tricks and his quackery? Let us, in the spirit people when the result of the General Election of his own wand-waving, mind, say is announced.

For the successful working of the democratic idea it is essential, among other things, that the two party system should prevail. This is not the case in the coming election. There are three parties, each with its own programme, who intend putting up something like 500 Candidates each, in May. This considerably confuses the issue. One wishes that the new Liberal Party, under the leadership of the Wizard, had remained in the political wilderness, there to work their miracles amongst themselves.

As we have said, the problem unemployment has been prostituted t party ends. The new Liberalism non claims to be able to solve the problem and to reduce the army of unemployed by half, within twelve months, without, any addition to the already heave load of taxation.

An Attempt to Gull The Nation

This is so obviously a blatant attempt to gull the nation that one is amazed that the boast should be treated seriously by anyone except its author. Yet, if we are to treat this claim of the Wizard as serious what can be said of the man who at this time comes forward with his alleged solution, after at least five years of silence Why were these wonderful plans not given to the nation during the past years of tribulation? Have they only been evolved during the last few weeks, under the exigencies of the approaching election? The altruism of the Wizard's claim to lift the nation "from the slough of despond to prosperity" is condemned by his past silence! True, his voice has often been raised in respect of unemployment, but only in criticism.

Away with this mockery, and this mocker of the nation's need The unemployed are in dire enough straits without the chimera of wizardry being held out to them. Let the problem be tackled seriously, soberly and intelligently, not degraded to the level of music hall conjuring. Why should this old

changed one iota, Let that be clearly understood. Let the records of these men be engraved on the tablets of our memory. Their policy is the continuance of those attacks which have wrought so much disaster. It is unadulterated Socialism! It is a campaign of destruction, until the edifice of capitalism comes "crashing to the ground"—By Constitutional methods!!! Mr. Ramsay MacDonald; who ought to know, says that "For the Labour Party, unlike other parties, is not concerned with patching the rents in a bad system, but with tramsforming Capitalism into Socialism," it will he observed that this is as revolutionary an utterance as ever the pages of history held. The term Socialism is used without any qualification. This transition to Socialism is to be carried out by the "ordinary machinery of democratic government" and "without disorder and confusion,"

There is no space within the limits of this article to criticise in detail the policy which goes under the name of Socialism, but this at least may be said of it: that any attempt to overthrow Capitalism and enthrone Socialism can only be accompanied, unavoidably and inevitably, by disorder and confusion, in which the poorer classes would be the chief sufferers

Failure of Communal System

It cannot be too often repeated that the idea of the common ownership and control of the means of production, distribution and exchange, has been tried and failed in various parts of the world in every age. In no place is

discernible as in the case of Russia. Lenin himself admitted its failure. In other countries the Continent. where Governments have been in a position to impose Socialism, they have set up committees to enquire into Socialism.

The policy which has failed in Russia, and on which Mr MacDonald congratulated the revolutionaries, is to be put into practice here if we place them in power. That is the real significance of the coming election.

Neither the men, nor their policy have It is true that the Socialist Party are not concerned with "patching the rents!" its sole concern is to make the rents in the fabric of civilisation increasingly larger until they have destroyed the whole garment.

Socialists Admit Capital's Success

There is no hope for England under. The Socialists Socialism-! plead, extenuation of the failure of past experiments, that they were "surrounded by Capitalist society."In other words, capitalism was the stronger and more efficient, There is then no rosy future, only a bloody dawn, for a Socialist England surrounded by a Capitalist world. Socialism is indeed a veritable "dance of death."

Germany's New Religion

T is interesting to note that General Ludendorf, the Q.M,G. of the German Forces during the late war is now conducting an anti-Christian Campaign throughout Germany.

The General Election A Call for Volunteers

URING times of political importance, such as that which is now approaching us, the call for volunteers to aid in keeping law and order is a matter which engages the attention of one branch of the Headquarter staff of the British Fascists.

There will be plenty for everyone to do between now and the end of May or the middle of June. Considering the political situation as it is at the moment, it is highly probable that the fight which the anticonstitutionalists will make will force upon us once again the necessity of mob-control.

We shall need, therefore, volunteers from both sexes to act as stewards at political meetings of all shades of opinion. Some will probably be quiet meetings, others may be disturbed; while it is possible that special squads will be required to maintain order, by physical force if necessary, at meetings when trouble is likely to occur. There is, in course of formation, a special squad, which will deal drastically with troublesome meetings in the London County. Volunteers are urgently called for to form this squad. Transport and full arrangements will be made and application for admission to this squad should be made at G.H.Q. as early as possible. Write to the Officer Commanding Q.Q. Squad at General Headquarters for detailed information.

The Channel Tunnel

THE project of the Channel Tunnel has been revived again for the fifth time, and it will no doubt be resurrected many times before people realise that the idea is useless except as a subject for innumerable articles in the press and as a fascinating topic of conversation. The *Daily News* has, however suggested that the project might be adopted as a definite plank in the programme of the Liberal Party in the forthcoming Election, and in view of the fact that it may be a much debated subject during the next few months, we feel that space will not be wasted if we, explain our reasons for condemning the idea as impracticable.

The Military Authorities

The strongest arguments against the tunnel are those raised by the military authorities. They agree that it could easily be flooded by the pressing of a button, but who is going to press it, and when? It will be no light responsibility, especially as the country will no doubt be engaged in delicate negotiations to avert war, and nothing must be done which may be construed as an act of hostility. By stopping traffic we would create an excuse for the enemy to make war, and yet on the other hand traffic must be stopped otherwise travellers of all nations will be drowned, with disastrous international results. It is therefore obvious that it could not be pressed at a moment's notice. The question would have to be put before the Cabinet. They in turn will have to consult the other countries, who jointly helped to finance the enterprise, with the result that while we are engaged in these negotiations the enemy will have taken good advantage of the time at his disposal.

The Economic Point of View

Even if the military difficulties are overcome, let us consider the idea from an economic point of view. According to The New Statesman it will have to earn at least £20,000 per day in order to pay interest on capital, and to allow for the cost of upkeep, The toll will therefore be about £500 per train. We do not do enough trade with continental countries tor merit this expense, nor are we likely to with the advent of the Tunnel. In fact it is continental countries who will gain the advantage, as they may then be able to send us larger quantities of luxury articles (in view of the more rapid transit offered them with less packing and handling than before), and it would be questionable if our own manufacturers and, producers could compete with the prices of continental goods.



The Sea Will Continue to be Good Enough

Still less could they balance the imports by placing goods on foreign markets at attractive and competitive prices. Since

there is no apparent prospect of a Channel Tunnel offering cheaper or greater transport facilities to us, the sea will continue to be good enough for the purposes of our export trade.

Technical Difficulties

The first supposed advantage of a Tunnel to the man in the street is that he will be able to go to Paris much quicker and in greater comfort. The idea of getting in a train at London and arriving in Paris without leaving it is certainly very attractive, but we are informed by Mr. Szlumper, the Assistant General Manager of the Southern Railway, that there is a difference in the Nord Railways gauge and the Southern Railway, Dover to London route, which would necessitate delay while passengers transfer from English to Continental rolling stock or vice versa. It is generally thought that passenger's baggage could be examined on the train, but owing to the number of dutiable commodities and also the number of articles requiring to be weighed and tested by hydrometer, this is not to be. Neither of the latter operations could be carried out on a moving train. 'Then travel by the tunnel will not be so quick after all impatient business men or tourists will still travel by air, which by the time the tunnel could be built will have made gigantic strides in the direction of a safer, cheaper and more frequent cross-channel service. As to the suggestion that crossing the channel by this route is more comfortable than a brief and invigorating sea voyage, surely a journey of about 40 minutes through a 25 miles tunnel under the sea, with the knowledge that it is mined every few miles and may be accidentally blown up any moment, is not the route for a nervous traveller to choose.

A Nerve-Racking Trip

No doubt there is actually very little clanger, but the sense of danger would be intense. People with a dread of seasickness will of course favour the under-channel crossing, but is it absolutely necessary to have a tunnel, where, a packet of Mothersills will effect a remedy?

The expense of the Channel Tunnel will be enormous, anything from £60,000,000 to a £100,000,000, If such a sum can be raised for such a foolhardy enterprise with Government support, why can't we do something to lighten our present terrible traffic problems If the London Traffic Authorities had this money at their disposal, to spend on overhead railways, widening street, etc., the toll of road deaths would be considerably reduced. By the time the Tunnel could be built, London traffic difficulties will be insurmountable; besides, in all probability, the Tunnel would be blown up before it could pay for itself, whilst money spent in solving our traffic difficulties will do a lasting good.



In addition to the objections, already mentioned, do we really desire to bind ourselves to the continental countries and become morally, materially and politically a

continental power, to be drawn even more into the web of European politics than at present? Even the Tunnel itself will not be entirely our property as other countries will no doubt be asked to help finance the scheme, with the result that we shall have to consult daughter who could accompany me as one of them on every little point in connection with my private secretaries on trips abroad. the Tunnel, thereby putting ourselves in a Since the flappers have been given the vote, subservient position.

No! England will never have a Tunnel. What has happened in the last few years in the way of naval, military and air development has tended, without exception, to render the Channel Tunnel a very dangerous experiment.

OOKING round, ten years after the conclusion of the Great War, at the general state of affairs in this country, and then looking into the future, can we consider the position with satisfaction, with equanimity? Can we pretend that the security and the prosperity which might have been thought our due after four years of wonderful achievements and sacrifices have fallen to our lot? Unfortunately it is far from being so. We did not fight the War "to make the world safe for democracy," We fought merely for security, in other words to save Europe from the domination of the Boche. Having done so, and having, with the help of our Allies, achieved a highly creditable victory, what was obviously our policy as regards home affairs?

A Policy of Reconstruction Needed

Common sense indicated a quiet policy of reconstruction, of nursing our resources, so recklessly expended during the War, o fostering industry, the main source of our wealth, and of dealing firmly with the aliendirected subversive forces. Instead of this, the blessed word democracy became our "old man of the sea," and politicians, drunk with the taste for spending which they had acquired in the War, vied with each other in orgies of promises and bribes to the electorate, and launched forth into grandiose schemes involving the expenditure of millions of our

The Rake's Progress

And so it has gone on for ten years, with no attempt to stay the "Rake's Progress." Taxes, rates and, in many cases, foreign competition thus industries and strangle unemployment, the workers are made to pay for those who won't work, the healthy for the sick, and the thrifty for those who, taught by the politicians that they have a right to rely on the state in case of unemployment, sickness or old age, throw their money about, heedless of the future.

As if a combination of week-kneed politicians and an electorate consisting of all men from the age of 21 and many women of 30 and upwards had not brought us near enough to ruin, we have a so-called Conservative Prime Minister who, after promising economy, conveniently forgets this pledge, and instead, uninvited, risks making matters worse by giving votes to women of 21. "Those whom the gods wish to destroy, they first make mad."

Give The Present Government Its Due

While credit is due to the present Government for dealing with the widespread revolutionary movement in this country, instigated by the 3rd Internationale, it was not until many strikes, ending with an attempt at revolution

in the guise of a General Strike, had cost the extension of the social services, in other country vast sums and irreparable losses of words a huge increases in expenditure. trade that the nettle was grasped. It is true that we are amazingly slow at perceiving facts and realizing situations. For instance, what a time it took the country to wake up to the disastrous inefficiency of the post-war Lloyd-George Government. Likewise to realize the seriousness of the revolutionary menace, directed largely through trade-union channels. Yes, but that does not alter the contention that soon we shall no longer be able to afford this easy-going short sightedness. After the War, when the country was sick and exhausted, its doctors, instead of nursing it, decided that further great calls should be made on its, diminished vitality, and the draining process continues. However strong the patient was originally, this cannot last indefinitely and there are signs which give rise to grave fears.

On the other hand, what signs are there of recovery? Few, alas, for the appetite of democracy is insatiable, and no political party has the courage to restrict the doling out of "rare and refreshing fruit."

Glib politicians prate of goodwill in industry and pretend to see signs of improving trade, but nothing is done to defend our basic industries against foreign competition, nor (beyond a tinkering measure such as the De-Rating Bill, of problematical value and involving already additional taxa-tion, apart from the almost certain appointment of further hordes of officials) to relieve trade of the immense burden of taxation it has to bear.

Until this relief and help are given no real recovery can be expected, and our progress towards national bankruptcy will continue.

Economy

To quote Mr. Baldwin's own words (the irony of it!), "Economy in every sphere is imperative." Brave words. But the amount of economy to be expected from Conservatives has been seen. The Socialists, more honest perhaps, that is if they mean to carry out their programme, are committed to the repeal of the McKenna Duties, a surtax on incomes, of "Transference to public ownerships of the coal, transport power and life-insurance industries," besides

So it is clear that what we have to expect is on the one hand, slow impoverishment leading to national insolvency, involving our inability to pay for the food we buy from abroad, and on the other hand a financial crash of the first magnitude, bringing in >its wake a condition of chaos and probably rioting and civil war.

Give Industry its Head



Can these disastrous consequences of our own folly be averted? Only by a government, or by a Man, of great courage, determination and Patriotism, who will give industry its head and help it by properly adjusted tariffs, ruthlessly cut down by millions the yearly expenditure, by thousands the number of government officials, and by several the number of Ministries, State insurance should be scrapped and arrangements be made for the work• to be handed back to the Friendly Societies.

As a result of the impetus given to industry unemployment would be decreased, but at the same time the scandals connected with the dole could be largely eliminated and the payments saved.

War pensions are a debt of honour and will automatically decrease as time goes on. The fighting services have been reduced to within a small margin of safety, but who shall say that large reductions are not possible in the cost of education? Dear Sir,---May I trespass on your columns to correct, with due humility, the fears of a correspondent in your last issue?

"P.J.H" of Bath has doubts in connection with the proposed Channel Tunnel. When talking to Sir William Bull, M.P., recently, I raised the question of invasion through the Tunnel, and we discussed the question very thoroughly. In normal times, the French will possess their end, and we ours, of the Tunnel.

War with France is unlikely and unthinkable, but an invading force sent either way through the Tunnel into a hostile country at the other end would be annihilated. Fifty men and two maxims could hold the Channel Tunnel against an army; it could be flooded, either with sea-water or with poison-gas, though as a matter of fact none of these expedients is favoured by the military authorities.

The Channel Tunnel is a very expensive proposition, and it is unlikely that in war either side would wish to damage it; they would desire to capture it intact. That is the obvious tactical course: The use of a modern double-portcullis, or the even simpler method unemployment in the mines and the loss of of discharging gravel, can completely render our coal markets in Italy and other Countries. the Tunnel useless during war without permanently affecting its value during I am not afraid to let British-born men and subsequent peace.

The whole question, however, is one that really does not arise, as our relation with the French people has been of the most cordial for the last eighty years. In any other war; for example, a European war, with France either neutral or as an ally, the Channel Tunnel would be a great asset to us, and had it existed in 1914, would probably have enabled us to break, the mad German rush into Belgium, a tactical adventure which the German staff would, no doubt, never have dared to undertake in such, circumstances. Is Democracy Failing? A Fascist's view of Fascism's place in Politics. By Geo. Flower

An article under the above heading appeared in Britannia of the 10th December, by the Marquis of Londonderry, K.G.

I hope to be able, in the following article, to show what ignorance prevails with regard to the Fascist Movement.

The Marquis says that the two movements, Fascism and Communism are in favour of revolt. He is right with regards the latter, but in connection with the former he is entirely mistaken. Fascism is out to oppose any form of revolt. Fascism would not have been in existence, hut for these subversive movements, i.e., Communism, with its numerous branches, under perplexing cloaks. He is right when he says that we are out for individual initiative. Does not his own party stand for this?—I think it does.

We are, according to him, "overexcited and unhappily, under-educated pioneers Democracy." We are not over-excited, nor are we under-educated.

"Communism is really Fascism upside down, and vice versa."—Surely the Marquis cannot have realised what he was writing.

British Fascism does not aim at revolution; it is established to prevent revolution, this has been proved in many other countries where the Fascist movement has taken root. Communism came into existence long before. Fascism was ever dreamed of, surely it is clear enough to even an under-educated individual, that Fascism came into life merely to oppose this excited rush of Communism.

A National Policy

British Fascism, as all other Fascist movements are National in policy. The

State Lotteries

suggestion has been put forward by "Parvel" that, in order to raise money on cheaper terms, the Government should appeal to the speculative spirit of the normal man. He proposes that this should be done by the issue of loans at a low rate of interest, but carrying the chance of a prize for the holder.

In effect, this is a form of lottery, and, as "Parvel" clearly foresees, the scheme will certainly meet with fierce opposition. He urges that we "should shed the hypocrisy that is fettering us."

The history of State Lotteries in England dates back for more than 300 years. Early in Queen Elizabeth's Reign, money was raised by means of a State Lottery for the repair of harbours. A lottery was floated in 1612, to assist the Virginia Company in establishing English Settlers in North America. In the year 1699, an Act was passed declaring all lotteries to be "common and public nuisances."

That should have finished lotteries. One can be forgiven for believing that it would have been the end of State Lotteries; but no, State Lotteries were issued from time to time until 1823, when an Act was passed which provided for the discontinuance of lotteries.

Let us now take the word "hypocrisy" as used by "Parvel" Temperance enthusiasts say that the consumption of alcohol is a sin, yet the Chancellor of the Exchequer expects to raise

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£140,000,000 out of the consumption of may visit the Clubs, and see for themselves wines, beer and spirits. He also hopes to how their money is spent. receive 6,000,000 from the betting tax. The hypocrisy of the betting tax is too obvious to need any comment.

But if it is legitimate to raise revenue by a tax on the sin of betting, why is it wrong for the state to raise money at a low rate of interest by appealing to the betting instinct of the average man?

The State needs money at a low rate of interest; the average man desires the pleasure of speculation; this is proved by Football Competitions, Newspaper Competitions, Draws, Hospital Ballots, Bazaars, jumble Sales and the amount of betting that goes on in spite of the law.

Why not legalise the whole thing, under the Entertainments Tax, with a tax on the price of the ticket? Or, why not pass a law making the whole thing illegal?

Few Hints on Photography in Spring



"When photographing towards the sun, give four times as much exposure as you would if the sun were behind you" is a good rule. Do not neglect to shield the lens to prevent direct rays from the sun passing

through it and causing "flare."

Most prints can be improved by judicious "trimming"—cutting away unwanted portions with a sharp pair of scissors or a trimming board.

The Autographic feature, which enables you to note on the picture itself what exposure you gave and the name of the subject and the lighting conditions at the time, the time of day, etc., before winding on, is very valuable because it enables you to get the exposure right next time if your picture is a failure through over or under-exposure. Your photographic dealer will usually tell you when returning your negatives and prints whether your exposures were correct or not.

Fair-haired sitters are usually best portrayed against a darkish background, and dark sitters against a lightish background. When you "stop-up" (or "stop-down") to the next f. number you double (or halve, in the second case) the amount of light admitted to the film. In other words you double (or halve) the exposure. Example:—You think right stop to

The famous> photographic slogan, "Expose for the shadows: the highlights will look after themselves," means that when estimating the amount of exposure required you should look at the darker parts of the scene and estimate how much exposure will be required to register the detail there; not necessarily all, the detail the eye can see—some of it may be ugly—but all the detail you want in your picture.

The members are determined to live up to the name of their Area and be the "first," not only in name but in actions.




On Wednesday, January 16th, 1929, the Members of the W.U. held a dance at the Harpurhey Conservative Club. This was

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
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
